Consolidation of the Tri-Cities will ease the property tax burden created by increased school costs, the secretary of the Hampton-Civilian Committee for Consolidation declared last night.

Speaking before a gathering of Cavalier Women's Club members, Hunter Andrews pointed out that two million dollars of the cost of the new high school on W. Queen St. is being defrayed by a city bond.

Interest and principal on this debt alone will cost Hampton taxpayers about \$100,000 a year for 30 years, he said.
